The mission of the JROTC program is to "Motivate Young People to Be Better Citizens". This course is designed to teach High School students the value of citizenship, leadership, service to their community, personal accountability & responsibility, and a sense of accomplishment, while instilling in them hard work, self-esteem, teamwork, and self-discipline. The program is a stimulus for promoting graduation from high school and it provides instruction and rewarding opportunities that will benefit the cadet, MHS campus, the Mustang community, and the nation.

<u>LET (Leadership Education Training) LEVELS:</u> JROTC is a four-year program (normally 9th - 12th.) First year students enter the program as a LET 1 cadet.

LET I - This course includes classroom and laboratory instruction. Students are introduced to the first three JROTC Core Units. <u>Unit 1, Citizenship in Action</u> includes the history, customs, traditions, organization, and purpose of Army Junior ROTC. <u>Unit 2, Leadership Theory and Application</u> students are introduced to basic leadership skills to include leadership principles, values, skills and attributes. <u>Unit 3, Foundations for Success</u> includes oral and written communication skills, conflict resolution, thinking and study skills, and diversity and self- awareness training. Additional areas of study may include marksmanship, rifle safety, 1st aid, map reading, physical fitness, and history. Students **MUST WEAR** the JROTC uniform at least one day per week; **THURSDAY**, has been designated as the day to wear the Army JROTC Uniform.

UNIFORMS: With only a few exceptions, Thursday, is the designated "Uniform Day". Uniform day is the entire school day 1st thru 7th periods. All students are issued a standard Army Cadet Service uniform. (ACSU). The uniform is more than a mere suit of clothes: it is a symbol of honor. tradition, and achievement, AND GREATLY RESPECTED IN THE COMMUNITY. A student's appearance and conduct while in uniform are indications of self-respect, pride and responsibility. All students are expected to wear the appropriate uniform on the scheduled "Uniform Day". The uniform must be worn all day while the student is at school. An excused absence on uniform day may be made up within the next four days (Friday, Monday, Tuesday r Wednesday). If the uniform is worn on the students first day back, he or she will receive for full credit based on the standard uniform inspection criteria. Let I students who come to class on uniform day, not in uniform, will also be allowed to make up the uniform inspection during the same week (Thursday, Friday, Monday, or Tuesday) with a 10-point deduction for each day late (i.e. maximum possible score of 90%, 80%, 70%, and 60%). If uniform wear for the week is not made up within the allotted time, the cadet will receive a zero for that week's inspection. A student who fails to wear or make up FIVE OR MORE uniform days during a semester will fail the class and may be dis-enrolled from the **JROTC** program the following semester. Exceptions will be handled on a case by case basis. This is strictly enforced!

<u>ATTENDANCE</u>: High School courses are arranged to meet the educational needs of our students and regular attendance is a requirement. Much of the value of any course is obtained by participation in numerous activities that take place in the classroom. Students must show up to class on time, have all required materials, and be prepared to actively participate in the learning process.

REQUIRED ACTIVITIES: All JROTC students are required to attend the Cadet Ball and Awards Ceremony held this school year on Saturday, 13 April 2019 at 6:00 PM on the Mustang High School Campus. All LET II-IV students are required to march with the JROTC Battalion in the Western Days Parade unless there are participating in the parade with another activity or group; Let-I cadets who have achieve enough of the marching skills and is competent will march in this year's Western Days Parade, which will be conducted on 8 September 2018.

<u>MATERIALS</u>: Text books, student workbooks and the student portfolio are maintained in the classroom. Students are expected to come to class with pen/pencil and paper and prepared to actively participate.

<u>HOMEWORK</u>: Your primary homework assignment is the maintenance and accountability of your issued uniform and accessories. All classroom and homework assignments must be submitted by the due date emphasized by the instructors in order to receive full credit for the activity.

<u>METHOD OF ASSESSMENT:</u> Your grade is based primarily upon class participation, examinations, unit tests, quizzes, uniform inspections, physical fitness and projects assigned by the Instructor Staff.

MAKE-UP WORK: Work missed during an excused absence can be made up. Work missed due to a school related activity is considered excused and can be made up as per the Mustang High School Student Handbook. If the absence is unexcused the Mustang High School Student Handbook will govern all made up work.

Friday – Physical Fitness Day (Students who do not participate in physical activities are required to write an essay as their make-up assignment.)

<u>PHYSICAL FITNESS:</u> All students enrolled in JROTC are required to participate in the Friday Physical Fitness activities. Any student who is physically unable or unwilling to participate will be given an alternate written assignment to complete in class. Any student who fails to complete the alternate assignment in class will be allowed to turn it in at the beginning of class on Monday. Students who fail to turn in the alternate written assignment in the specified period of time will have **20 points deducted from their next uniform inspection grade**. This is strictly enforced!

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES: JROTC offers several extracurricular opportunities. Participation in extracurricular activities **is optional, but highly encouraged**. Practice time for these activities will usually take place before or after the regular school day. Most competition events will be conducted on Saturdays.

<u>CADET RANK & AWARDS</u>: Cadet's rank and awards are based on: academic performance, motivation, participation and demonstrated leadership potential. Recognition awards include ribbons, medals and certificates which fall into the following categories;

- Academics
- Athletics & Physical fitness
- Military (drill, color guard, rifle tm, adventure training, orienteering)
- Miscellaneous (Parades, Service Learning, JROTC Staff)

EXPECTATIONS: Respect for your fellow classmates, school property, and yourself is a must. Be on time to class and be prepared to contribute and learn. Be in the proper uniform for the occasion and wear your cadet uniform every week as required.
